As a result of attending the Interfaith Pathways to Promise conference in October 2009, a group of attendees began seeking others who shared a common vision of helping people of different faith traditions support individuals and families struggling with mental health issues.

This core group of individuals and organizations formed the Suburban Chicago Interfaith Mental Health Coalition.

In 2011, the coalition changed its name to the Interfaith Mental Health Coalition (IMHC) and created a website, www.interfaithmhc.org.

Additionally, the IMHC also created an email list to inform faith communities about mental health educational events and online resources.
